NOTES OF A REVOLUTIONARY

Revolution in the seminary? How revolting! Not really. It seems to me that "revolution" embraces all that we mean by "the spirit of St. Mark's".

Curiously, "revolution" seems to denote two contradictory meanings. The first is "a dramatic overthrow of the existing order" such as the Industrial and American Revolutions. The second meaning is "the steady turning about a fixed point" such as the revolution of the earth around the sun these meanings reinforce each other in one continuous act.

The Old Testament prophets called the Chosen People to turn their hearts away from idols to the true God (metanoia), and to follow Him all the rest of their days



Christ brought another dramatic change doing away with man's old role. His Easter (and ours) is the greatest revolution in the cosmic order.

The early Church pulled off the greatest revolution in man's history, rising from an underground movement of undesirables to become the dominant faith of the Western world. So you see, we have a long history of both dramatic change and steady turning.

St. Mark's itself has changed in its policies, activities, and spiritual life, as our sixyear veterans can attest. Yet we are always turning about the priesthood of Christ.

Each of us is caught up in our own personal revolutions, some violent. The changing world, the changing Church, and the changes of growing up press in on us. All this upheaval takes a tremendous amount of energy, thought, and faith. It is so easy to become war-weary and give in to the temptation to "stop rocking the boat" But if history is

worth anything, it is to teach us that people and institutions which suppress change begin to die very quickly. We are called to be revolutionaries: changing, experimental, and open to new life. If we can turn Abbie Hoffman around, it's a sort of "revolution for the heaven of it." It's the spirit of St. Mark's.

This book is a record of the impressions made over this past year of turning. It is Our book. Nearly all the work involved was done by the high school students here at SMS. In fact, this year has been one of the finest responses from the high school this editor can recall. There are many mistakes, we know, but the Tribe is proud of it. The colors of the cover are the green of hope and the orange of early dawn.

This book is the fruit of a great amount of work, much of it late at night and on week-ends. I want to make a point of thanking the all-nighter crews, juniors and sophomores, who gave an enormous amount of effort, and Steve Pasto and John Mrofchak who were the backbone of our staff. Tim, Dave, and I, a sleepy trio turn over the editorship to capable hands.





As long as we have a concerned, dedicated faculty and responsive, prayerful students, we need not fear the troubled times ahead.

Like many before me, I am leaving. I thank all of you for your priceless help and for enriching my life these past years.

And stoop to build them up with worn out tools;


If you can fill the unforgiving minute
